

Each month, I'm hoping to have someone talk with us about how they live out and into their faith. This month, I've asked All Saints' new member Robert Thompson to share something of his life of faith as a monastic - an ancient, historic way of being Christian that's still alive and well. There will be time for questions. Here's Robert:

"What is monasticism?" – Robert Thompson O.S.B. will lead a conversation about monasticism, especially within the contemporary Anglican context on Sunday, September 17th. Robert is a vowed member of the New Benedictine Community (of the Holy Trinity), a dispersed Anglican religious community with members currently in England, Spain, Mexico, and the United States in Illinois, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Wisconsin. The New Benedictine Community participates in the National Association of Episcopal Christian Communities and in the Anglican Benedictine Confederation. Robert has an M.A. in philosophy from Memphis State University and an M.A.R. in theology from Memphis Theological Seminary.

Why might you try Sacred Ground?

On August 28, 1963, 250,000 people came to the March on Washington. Among many memorable words spoken or sung, Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech remains iconic. Eight years earlier, on August 28, 1955, Emmett Till was brutally murdered. His story and his funeral also have become iconic. In different ways, those two moments each helped birth a movement. When I stop and remember these moments in history, it reminds me of why I now do the work I keep doing.

Nine years ago, having spent nearly 30 years in full-time church work, I officially retired, wondering what might be next in my life. A week later, Michael Brown was killed in Ferguson, Missouri. His death deeply moved me. Suddenly, a new chapter of my life's work began. I now choose to live in the world of racial healing and justice. One question begs me to answer it daily: "What is mine to do *now*?"

After several years working in various racial justice contexts, I was led to a Sacred Ground circle in the fall of 2021. Sacred Ground had already become something of a national success story (there have been more than 2,500 circles so far), even in the midst of the pandemic, when I first participated. Originally created for white Episcopal Church folks to do our personal work of looking at our own racism, Sacred Ground is now available to people of all faiths and none.

As a lifelong learner, I will always have more to learn, more work to do, when it comes to seeing how I have been part of the problem called racism - and how I need to be part of the solution. The more I've learned and experienced in Sacred Ground circles, the more I know I want to keep sharing that powerful experience of learning with others, both as a participant and a facilitator.

I invite you to join me for an information hour on Thursday, September 7th, at 6 pm Central Time, in person or online (you can participate on Zoom, like hundreds of other people have). An accomplished pianist and exceptional music teacher, Sharon was born Sharon Lee Miller in 1936 in Gary, Indiana, to parents Leona and Peter Miller. Her earliest memories were of cooking for her younger siblings, going to Cubs baseball games at Wrigley Field, and learning to play the piano. She remained an excellent cook (known for her wonderful pies), a die-hard Cubs fan, and an avid advocate for music within the Arts community in Memphis.

Sharon was actively involved with many organizations. They included: The Etude Music Club, the Greater Memphis Music Teachers Association (she had recently won their prestigious Music Teacher of the Year Award for the second time), the Music Teachers National Association, The Germantown Symphony Orchestra (as an original founder of the group), and she was a valued member of the congregation at All Saints Episcopal Church.

She thrived as a middle school piano teacher at Colonial Middle School, where she earned the nickname of Dr. Mom from her students. In her later years she taught Music Theory, Fundamentals of Music, and Music Appreciation at Southwest Community College. Additionally, Sharon had been recently giving private piano lessons to children of various ages. Her children, Dr. Cory Momany and his wife Dr. Michelle Momany, and daughter Shelley Momany, remember her often saying, "I try to take my students from where they are, and get them to where they need to be."

In addition to her children, Sharon is mourned by an amazing grandson, Dale Momany, son of Drs. Cory and Michelle Momany, as well as her siblings Mike Miller, Bette Inderski, Kathy (Jo) Zakrzewski, and Diane Herbst. Sharon also leaves behind eleven nieces and nephews (and their children as well) who have adored and admired her their entire lives.

A proud member of the Gibson's Donuts Breakfast Bunch, Sharon was also a frequent patron of several local restaurants: Little Pigs, Mulan, A-Tan, and Patrick's, as she was a firm believer in supporting local businesses. Another local favorite spot of Sharon's was Shelby Farms Park, which she visited almost every
